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
What is Intergenerational Practice?

There are several definitions and descriptors used for intergenerational practice, most of which share an affinity to the commonly used international definition:

'Intergenerational practice aims to bring people together in purposeful, mutually beneficial activities which promote greater understanding and respect between different generations, and contributes to building more cohesive communities. Intergenerational practice is inclusive, building on the positive resources that the younger and older generations have to offer each other and those around them.'

(Beth Johnson Foundation, 2009)

Intergenerational practice is about more than bringing younger and older people together. It is a systemic approach to community development and wellbeing that recognises and values the contribution of all generations who live there. We all have a role in supporting the growth of intergenerational approaches collaboratively.



Why Celebrate Intergenerational Relationships?

There are people and organisations across the world forging intergenerational relationships through a range of fantastic, creative projects. From schools and colleges, care homes to nurseries, sports groups to housing providers, local authorities to national governments, we're all working hard on connecting people of all ages together in mutually beneficial ways. We don't, however, always share our impact with the wider world. That's where Global Intergenerational Week comes in. Global Intergenerational Week shines a light on projects across the world, highlighting their intrinsic value and providing them with the recognition that they deserve.

It's vital, that at a time of drastic demographic change, we are proactive in our approach to connecting generations; to combat social problems such as ageism and social isolation, to improve educational outcomes in all ages, and to build sustainable and cohesive communities, where people of all ages can flourish. Intergenerational practice is an evidence-informed solution to these social problems and it is therefore important that its value is recognised and adopted by key decision makers across the world.

Too often intergenerational practice is considered a 'nice' add-on to existing practices. This is a narrative that needs to change. Intergenerational practice ought to instead, be deemed an essential consideration for upstream health policy, an essential practice within social care, an essential component of educational curriculum and an essential consideration in urban planning and development. Why? Because intergenerational practice makes a difference in people's lives. Turn the page to learn how!



Key Findings

- Children involved in early-years intergenerational programmes report greater confidence, empathy and self-regulation of behaviour, than those who aren't. (Femia et al. 2008)
- The National Mentoring Partnership reports that intergenerational mentoring programmes have shown a **55%** increase in positive attitudes towards school among participating youth. **(National Mentoring Partnership)**
- Intergenerational groups are cost effective therapeutic groups that benefit both vulnerable youth and older adults in a non-threatening, caring environment. (Jones et. al, 2009)
- Communities that invest in intergenerational initiatives experience a 20% increase in community cohesion and a 15% decrease in crime rates. (Generations United)
- Interventions for intergenerational contact are among the most effective for reducing ageism against older people. (WHO, 2023)
- Cross-age friendships correlate with reduced ageism, for both younger and older people (Dykstra & Fleischmann, 2018)

That's why this year, Global Intergenerational Week will centre around one key theme: **Intergenerational Practice is Essential**.



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Benefits of Intergenerational Relationships

To young people...

- Increased self-esteem and confidence through interaction with other generations.
- New meaningful friendships.
- Improved understanding of people from different generations, resulting in the tackling of stereotypes and misconceptions.
- Learning of new and important life skills.

To older people...

- Improved health and wellbeing as a result of participating in new activities which may involve both physical and mental activity and stimulation.
- Reduced social isolation: older people can interact with new groups, participate in activities and form new friendships.
- Older people with dementia have been found to display positive responses and smile more frequently when interacting with different generations.

To communities...

- Increased community social cohesion and social capital as a result of purposeful activities designed to encourage relationships and connections to grow.
- Improved social responsibility across generations due to increased involvement in the local community.
- Creates place pride, where everyone feels that they can contribute to their local community.

Broader impact

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Daily Themes

In addition to our wider campaign theme, each day of Global Intergenerational Week 2024 will take on a different intergenerational theme. This allows us to demonstrate the wide-reaching value of intergenerational practice, across a diverse range of policy areas.

Our global country leads will collaborate with local partners and other country leads, to deliver events in line with these themes.
